Civics Emphasis in Lessons & Events

In our Social Studies work this year, Civics has been a particular focus. Washington State sets "Essential Academic Learning Requirements" for various subject areas, and the top one for Social Studies is: "The student understands and applies knowledge of government, law, politics and the nation's fundamental documents to make decisions about local, national and international issues, and to demonstrate thoughtful,

participatory citizenship."

Teachers are addressing this in different ways, depending on the developmental readiness of their students. All of our teachers are considering how social justice fits in this area. After early dismissal on a recent Wednesday, teachers used collaboration time to examine the Teaching Tolerance organization's Social Justice Standards (PDF at <http://bit.ly/TTSocialJustice>) and designed grade-level lessons on "identity." This aligns with identity safety work encouraged by our District. In a recent book, "Identity Safe Classrooms," authors Dorothy Steele and Becki Cohn-Vargas explain that "identity safe classrooms are those in which teachers strive to ensure students that their social identities are an asset rather than a barrier to success in the classroom. And, through strong positive relationships and opportunities to learn, they feel they are welcomed, supported, and valued as members of the learning community" (from www.identitysafeclassrooms.org).

Martin Luther King Jr. Assembly tomorrow: This week, students have been thinking about how their actions can make a difference in our community, as we plan our Martin Luther King Day Assembly (tomorrow, Jan. 12, at the start of the school day). Laura Strand: Teaching Students How the Real Artists Do It

We are excited to have you as partners in this work! The Feeling Words curriculum is focused on expanding students' emotion vocabulary through academic links, personal associations, family stories, and creative

expression. You will hear about this from classroom teachers and have the chance to share stories and experiences from your own lives with your child. We hope this will be a fun and novel way to connect with your child.

Do you need a refresher on RULER? Strand: Overcome Fear of Art

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on Vashon Island, where she used to live before moving to West Seattle, and more recently, Capitol Hill.

Ms. Strand's first assignment this year was for her students to make CD case "story boxes." The students were to decorate the story boxes with images that told a story about themselves. But her students were in for a surprise when they saw Ms. Strand's own story box, which included a picture of her 15-year-old son and... a parachute. It turns out that Ms. Strand's father was a skydiver, and when she turned 18, she got to go skydiving herself.

"You have to climb out on to the wing, and then, holding onto the strut, have to hang from the plane. Your feet are dangling thousands of feet above the ground," she recalls. "And then you have to let go."

Doing art, Ms. Strand says, requires the same leap of faith as skydiving. Many kids come to her scared of making art, or scared of showing their creative work to others. Often, that just reflects how much experience they have had making art in the past. What she wants is for all her students to have the courage to try.

She quotes Ray Bradbury: "You've got to jump off cliffs all the time and build your wings on the way down."
