How We Teach about Gender Diversity

At Thurgood Marshall, and at many other District elementary schools, we have students who identify as transgender. This is when a person may be assigned one gender at birth, but later identifies as another gender. For example, a child may be born biologically male, but knows in her heart and mind that she is actually female. When a person decides to publicly make the transition to live as the gender with which they identify, other people may be confused. When a student challenges the stereotypes for a gender, other children may have questions.

We are working hard at our school to create a climate in which everyone can feel they belong. Teachers regularly talk with students about how we can support and celebrate the differences in our school. School is a place where children are taught to respect one another, be kind, and work together regardless of their differences. By creating a more tolerant, inclusive, accepting school environment, we show our students how to recognize and resist stereotypes. We teach children to be upstanders – not bystanders – when they see bullying occur. Learning about gender diversity is part of this work.

Ms. Meghan Kaloper, our school Counselor, has been talking with our students about how people can express themselves in the way that feels best for them. We want all children to feel safe, able to learn, and comfortable being themselves. We prepare all students to think about their response when a child dresses or acts in ways that might be unexpected based on gender.

Our teachers are receiving training and support from Seattle Public Schools in talking about gender diversity in a way that supports all kids and families. District Health Coordinator Lisa Love and Aidan Key of Gender Diversity, a nonprofit, were with us this week. The District is introducing optional classroom materials on age-appropriate concepts of gender and gender identity. **The K-5 Gender Book kit** contains at least one book and corresponding lesson per grade level, developed by community members, parents and educators in response to the state's adoption of new Health Education standards. Concepts such as gender, gender roles, gender expression and gender identity are included in the standards for elementary schools. Once we receive our kit, it will be in the Library, where parents are

Help Reduce Kids' Anxiety

How can you support your child as we head into our standardized testing season?

Many students experience anxiety over high-stakes tests, and find it difficult to show their best work.

Here are some tips for you and your child:

- Aim for a good night's sleep, a healthy breakfast and comfortable clothes.
- Help reframe anxiety. Research shows that a little bit of stress before a test is better than none (it helps people perform better!) Stress gets us ready for the task ahead.
- Slow, deep breaths can keep reduce stress.
- Be positive and encouraging, and plan something fun for after the test!

TM Students Win Statewide PTA Awards

Lena Walton (Grade 5) and Menelik Victor Asrade (Pre-K) have both won an Award of Excellence (2nd place) for their entries in the statewide round of the National PTA's "Reflections" arts contest. Congratulations!

Lena's "Beyond" was selected in the Grades 3-5 Film category, and Menelik's "Technologies Within Reach" took its honors in the Special Artists division.

Lena's animated film (viewable at https://youtu.be/_JwsHHSgvps) involved tiny adjustment to pieces of clay for each frame. "I liked the idea of abstract claymation because all people interpret your film differently," she says. "I enjoy stop-motion animation because you take hundreds of photos and then are rewarded by seeing inanimate objects move and your imagination coming to life." She expects to keep working in the technique.

Menelik's artwork clearly spoke to the Reflections theme of "Within Reach." (See it at www.tmlink.org/technologies-within-reach/). He was inspired to create his piece because technology makes his life a lot easier. "I use technology to play, learn, create art and communicate with adults." He explains, "I have speech delay. I have few words so I use my talker to communicate.

"Recently, I used an app to practice my subtraction. I also learned to take pictures with an iPad."

"Because technology is such a big part of my life, I was able to create this art with the help of my mom," he adds.

The awards ceremony will be April 28 at the Green River Community College in Auburn.
